CALL TO ORDER: A regular meeting of the Hayward Area Shoreline Planning Agency (HASPA) was called to order at 3:03 P.M. and role was taken by Devan Reiff. Trustee Márquez served as Chair of the meeting.

 Approval of Minutes from the HASPA Meeting held on June 8, 2022 - Draft Action Minutes of June 8, 2022

Trustee Hodges motioned the vote, Trustee Waespi seconded. Vote: 3 Ayes, approved unanimously.

Public Comments: None

2. City of Hayward Project Updates (City Staff)

Proposed industrial Shell building at 3636 Enterprise, proposed 219,656 sq. ft building on 10.86-acre site. Were deemed complete on November 10, 2021. An Initial Mitigated Negative Declaration was submitted, and comment period completed on August 29, 2022. Two comments were received, one from the Bay Area Air Quality Management District and one from the CA Dept of Toxic Substance Control. The item is scheduled for Planning Commission decision on September 22, 2022.

Prospective Trustee Duncan asked where the building is located. Taylor Richard stated that 3636 Enterprise is located south of the Hayward Wastewater plant, 0.79 miles from the shoreline itself, north of Highway 92. The land currently has several radio towers on it.

Trustee Waespi asked what the visual impact is on the Hayward Shoreline Interpretive Center? Taylor said that she can email the height of the building and planner contact to the Trustees. Chair Márquez asked that the packet be sent to the group.

3. Discussion and Approval of San Francisco Estuary Partnership Support Letter (Heidi Nutters, David Donovan)

Senior Program Manager with SF Estuary Partnership – Heidi Nutters, and David Donovan, Plant Manager at the Water Pollution Control Facility presented on behalf of Jacki Zipkin. Grant project title is Breaking Ground - Implementing nature-based solutions, engaging communities, and advancing innovative projects. Key partners are SF Estuary Partnership, City of Palo Alto, East Bay Dischargers Authority, City of Hayward, Save The Bay, Nuestra Casa, Arizona State University, Fairfield-Suisun Sewer District, US Geological Survey.

This is an EPA Water Quality Improvement Fund Grant, they are requesting \$4 million, with \$4 million match. Primary grant activities are Palo Alto Horizontal Levee construction, and community based monitory program focused on microplastics and metals. Develop future projects including Fairfield-Suisun Sewer District horizontal levee, and City of Hayward treatment ponds.

David Donovan stated that the City of Hayward recently signed a contract to bring plant up to current standards. The Hayward Water Pollution Control Plant Multi-Benefit Shoreline Project will create a nature-based solution that integrates freshwater treatment wetland and horizontal levee with an approximately 100-acre area, located along the Hayward Regional Shoreline. The goal is to reduce nitrogen discharge from waste into the SF Bay. The project will provide flood protections for the water pollution control plant, Russel city energy center, and surrounding communities. Connection to HASPA – will leverage the EBDA First Mile Horizontal Levee, includes HASPA members including City of Hayward and EBDA. Links to project identified in the HASPA Master Plan. If funded, the project will coordinate closely with HASPA.

Prospective Trustee Duncan was surprised that the presentation didn't reference the Oro Loma horizontal levee nutrient optimization project that has been implemented for 2.5 years. David responded that the pilot project at Oro Loma was their inspiration for the upcoming project. They piggy-backed on the First Mile plan to see what could be used for their plant. Some nutrient removal will happen inside plant before additional nutrient removal using nature-based methods. Prospective Trustee Duncan asked what the connection is with Palo Alto? Heidi said the SF Estuary project works collaboratively across jurisdictions to share lessons learned and advance projects into different stages of construction. It is a SF Bay wide approach to address issues. The EBDA First Mile and the Hayward Wastewater plant are currently closed systems, this would bring them to the discharging directly into the bay.

Trustee Waespi supports signing the letter and stated that it continues to make HASPA relevant and cutting edge. Mentioned that reducing nutrients is going to be front page news especially due to fish die off that has been happening.

Chair Márquez asked if staff has plans to make this presentation anywhere else? If they do, she would like to see it updated with references to Oro Loma's projects. Chair Márquez asked if there were any changes or modifications to the letter as presented? None were presented.

Trustee Waespi moved to approve this letter for the SF estuary partnership. Trustee Hodges seconded. Vote: 3 Ayes, passed unanimously.

4. Draft HASPA JPA Term Sheet Review and Recommendation

Devan Reiff, Principal Planner with East Bay Regional Park District (EBRPD), gave the presentation, this item was attachment three in the board packet. Current HASPA members are EBRPD, City of Hayward, and HARD, with Oro Loma Sanitary District and Alameda County Mosquito Abatement District as prospective HASPA members. TAC members are currently EBRPD, City of Hayward, HARD, EBDA, AC Mosquito Abatement District, OLSD, Caltrans, Capitol Corridor, Bay Trail, and AC Flood Control District. Two clauses were changed or added in the Draft HASPA Term Sheet in the Purpose section, and one in the Governance section.

a. Feedback (HASPA Trustees)

Trustee Waespi welcomed Oro Loma and AC Mosquito Abatement and is happy they are joining HASPA. Under the term sheet, coordinating authority for a Trustee is now three years, instead of five years, and he likes that it should be less years. Need to define what the coordinating authority does. Do we know if we need to do an audit every year? Devan said that the Park District has an auditor on staff, and we will get back to the group with an answer if yearly audits are required.

Trustee Hodges, what is the timeline for this JPA? Devan said that the language says and indefinite term of the JPA, that it wouldn't terminate. Hodges hopes we can continue to add more agencies and TAC members. Would like to see JPA language from the EBDA JPA.

Chair Márquez said that the purpose and mission as drafted doesn't specify protecting critical infrastructure. Would like to include that in final term sheet. In the Finance section, would like to know if there was language about the ability to raise amounts of fees. Devan said that is mentioned in the section that is allowed for flexibility, will be included in the new JPA language.

b. Feedback (Prospective HASPA Trustees)

Director Duncan said that there needs to be language about reviewing the language of the JPA every so often to make sure the Trustees are understanding the elements of the JPA. Chair Márquez suggested every three years, so it aligns with the coordinating authority. Director Duncan said that would be good, and asked if there was something about the TAC members responsibility in the term sheet. What is the deliverable for the TAC members? Devan suggested adding those details into the JPA language. Director Duncan said that would be fine to add it then. Devan asked what sort of review she wanted after three years – staff level report, or a vote per the Trustees? Director Duncan hadn't thought that far out, is looking for validation that each agency is recommitted and make sure that it is reviewed. Devan asks to defer that language into the JPA negotiations.

Director Hentschke said that they are very comfortable with term sheet language.

Opened public comment: none received.

Chair Márquez adds that she is not comfortable with the indefinite term of JPA. Devan suggests including three-year term language in final JPA agreement.

c. Recommendation to Approve Draft HASPA | PA Term Sheet (HASPA Trustees)

Chair Márquez asked if anyone has an issue with adding a bullet point under Purpose and Motion to say protecting critical infrastructure. No one objected.

Will discuss remaining two items mentioned brought up while writing JPA language. I. TAC members responsibilities and duties 2. Language regarding review of JPA agreement when coordinating authority changes.

Chair Márquez motioned to approve, Trustee Waespi seconded. Three ayes, motion passes unanimously.

5. Discussion of Budget for Producing New HASPA JPA (EBRPD)

Park District is proposing to hire outside counsel to draft the JPA agreement using adopted term sheet. There is value in a neutral third-party drafting the language, the Park District legal counsel will manage the contract at an expense of \$35,000. No objections to seeking outside council. There are two options: I. Expend funds from 2022 dues (around \$48,000); or 2. Raise additional funds separate from 2022 dues.

Trustee Waespi says the Park District could go either way. How do prospective members from Oro Loma and Mosquito Abatement feel?

Trustee Hodges suggests taking it out of 2022 dues to keep things moving.

Director Hentschke says that it makes sense to take it out of 2022 dues. Director Duncan thinks taking it from current funds makes sense.

Trustee Márquez suggests that as well.

Trustee Hodges makes a motion to expend funds from the 2022 dues for outside counsel. Trustee Waespi seconded. Three ayes, motion passes.

6. Old/New Business (TAC)

For scheduling a tour of the Hayward Shoreline, would we prefer a walking tour or vehicle tour? In terms of logistics a walking tour would be easiest. Trustee Waespi stated that a walking tour would be good and that he would like to invite everyone on the Boards of AC Mosquito Abatement, Oro Loma Sanitary, HARD, EBRPD and the members of the Hayward City Council. Trustee Waespi also wants to invite the area's newly elected representatives, and he wants the tour to be all encompassing. Chair Márquez suggests a special meeting where there is the tour and public comment only. Trustee Waespi suggests tour with new representatives in January or February and during a King Tide. King Tides are the highest of the year and are representative of what the shore looks like in the future with climate change. Director Duncan suggested making a recording of the King Tide to remind others of what we are working toward fixing. No other input from staff or members.
