
The East Bay Regional Park District Improvement Projects Economic and Social Impact Analysis (Analysis) estimates the economic and fiscal impacts of 93 of the Park District's future improvement projects by analyzing:

- I. The economic impacts of project construction, including preliminary planning which supports jobs for architects, engineers, biologists and more
- 2. The economic on-going impacts which will be generated by the new project's day-to-day operations



# Projects Reviewed for the Analysis' Estimates

The Park District is currently undertaking over 120 improvement projects, including expansion of park and trail access, new trail construction and enhancements to existing visitor use facilities

This report estimates the economic and fiscal impacts of 93 of the Park District's improvement projects (pictured left)



# Key Term Definitions

	Direct Effect	The output of goods or services from <b>immediate spending</b> by the Park District's construction and future day-to-day operations of project sites.
	Indirect Effect	The additional output of goods or services generated by the Park District's <b>supply chain</b> . The indirect effect is supported by expenditures from the District's immediate spending.
/ ii m	Induced Effect	The set of <b>expenditures made by households</b> on local goods and services as a result of increased labor income generated by the direct and indirect effects.
	Job Years	One job year is <b>one year of work for one person</b> . If one construction worker is needed every year for five years, that is considered five job years.

# Economic & Fiscal Impact of Construction

- \$123.3 million in economic output from direct spending, 701 job years of employment, \$72.5 million in labor income and \$15 million in tax revenues
- \$42.1 million in economic output from indirect spending, 230 job years of employment, \$17.8 million in labor income and \$4.3 million in tax revenues
- \$48.8 million in economic output from induced spending, 268 job years of employment, \$16.8 million in labor income and \$6 million in tax revenues

### One-Time Total Impact

- □ \$214.2 million in economic output
- ☐ 1,199 job years of employment
- □ \$107.1 million in labor income
- ☐ \$25.4 million in federal, state and local tax revenues

# Economic and Fiscal Impact of Operations

- \$12 million in economic output from direct spending, 70 jobs, \$9.4 million in labor income and \$2.2 million in tax revenues
- \$5.6 million in economic output from indirect spending, 27 jobs, \$1.9 million in labor income and \$0.6 million in tax revenues
- \$5.1 million in economic output from induced spending, 33 jobs, \$2.1 million in labor income and \$0.8 million in tax revenues

Annual Total Impact

- □ \$23.7 million in economic output
