Martin Luther King Jr. Regional Shoreline - Enjoy a Bay Area birding hotspot with many kinds of birds to observe in the marsh, open water, and on land. **Following the walk, there will be a conference at Martin Luther King Jr. Shoreline Center.**

Mon, May 27: 9-11 AM

Big Break Regional Shoreline - Seek out birds living in the Delta while discussing past and current challenges faced by Black birders.

Tue, May 28: 9-11 AM

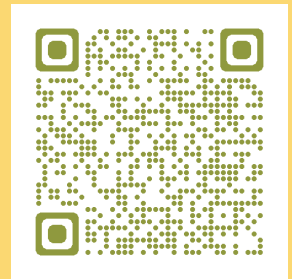
Hayward Regional Shoreline - Come explore the shoreline and learn about the legacy of names in the birding world and how many will soon change.
